

Postgraduate training for social workers

The Postgraduate Diploma in Advanced Fieldwork
Practice and Supervision (Social Work)
(2009-2010) in the School of Applied Social Studies,
University College Cork

The Postgraduate Diploma in Advanced Fieldwork Practice and Supervision (Social Work) is the only nationally accredited, post qualifying course in social work. It has been running in the School of Applied Social Studies, UCC since 2001. It is a Level 9 academic programme, part-time and run on Fridays over the period from mid September to the end of May. Participants attend a formal lecture programme at the university two Fridays every month. Peer support and library study take place on alternative Fridays.

The aim of this programme is to prepare relatively new and experienced professionally qualified social workers for the task of practice teaching and supervision of social work students. This course offers a balance of theoretical inputs, experiential learning, self directed and library study. It involves on the job supervision of a professional social work student (MSW/BSW) while on placement, over a 14 week period (January-April).

The course team is committed to developing and supporting the philosophy and practice of reflective learning throughout the course. Providing participants with opportunities to reflect on their own practice and to reassess their own learning in the light of new knowledge and experience is an important focus throughout the course. In this regard, all participants are required to have supervised at least one social work student prior to entry onto the course

While on the course, participants are tutored and supervised. Group work is the main method of teaching and learning on the course and lecturers and tutors encourage participants to bring their practice experiences into the classroom thereby enriching the whole learning experience for all participants.

Evaluations of the course with course participants and graduates have informed us that the course has had a value and merit way beyond practice teaching and student supervision. Many of our past graduates have gone on to further study and others have been promoted within their agencies to team leader, senior practitioner and other senior positions.

As the reality of social work registration comes down the track, we believe this course will be an important one in terms of providing social workers with opportunities to pursue further professional studies. This course has an academic weighting of 60 credits.
