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Introduction

Doctoral students produce original and publishable research, but often only those in their own specific disciplines have been able to access the publications arising out of the research, or are aware of the breadth of research being undertaken. A key aim of *The Boolean*, from its inception to the present day, has been to ensure that this research is accessible to the wider community, outside academia, including stakeholders and potential employers of UCC doctoral graduates. Doctoral researchers have had to adhere to the specific Guidelines for Authors, to adapt their writing to reflect this audience. Also, in order to be allowed to submit an article, authors had to agree also to review articles, gaining useful critical analysis skills in a discipline outside of their own.

The inaugural volume of *The Boolean* in 2010, was followed by another four volumes between 2010 and 2015. Similar to previous volumes, the 2022 issue of the relaunched *The Boolean*, provides a fascinating snapshot of just some of the diverse research being undertaken by doctoral students at UCC. However, it differs in one important fundamental aspect. Reflecting the increasing involvement of postgraduate research students at all levels in the University, the current volume has been a student-led initiative from the outset: From two doctoral students, Lorenzo Niemitz and Stephen Murphy contacting Prof. Alan Kelly (Dean at the time of the first three volumes) and me suggesting a new volume, to the establishment of a steering group, the setting up of a new digital platform, to the call, submission and review of manuscripts.

With 35 articles, on a diverse range of subjects, from '*Developing Potential in the Family Business - Learnings from a Queen Concert*' to '*Quantum Control: Teaching Schrödinger's Cat to Compute the Impossible*', we hope that the current volume, will interest and inspire you.

Thank you to all who have made this volume possible, including authors, reviewers and supervisors.
